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





In July 1919 the New York Central Lines company magazine published this advertisement showing the then under construction cutoff through Tonawanda and North Tonawanda. The relocated alignment required several bridges, one of which crosses Ellicott Creek in the City of Tonawanda. An article in Engineering News Record and a virtually identical version in the Central's company magazine from that era details that the bridge itself was relocated from the Mohawk valley downstate and had served on the Central's West Shore line where it crossed over the Erie Canal. That part of the Canal was being abandoned with the coming of the new Barge Canal which is the project that necessitated the Tonawanda cutoff in the first place. In 1919 steel shortages caused by the just ended World War I and a frugal Central management reused the existing bridge instead of contracting for an entirely new structure and scrapping the old one. Obviously, the bridge would have had to been dismantled at its old location and then transported to Tonawanda. Confirming exactly how that was done has been an ongoing investigation by Larry Gustina and your editor for some time now. Finding specific documentation on this move has proved to be elusive, but thanks to the above ad, we now know just a bit more of the puzzle, identifying the contractor who performed the work. My guess is that the bridge trusses were at least partially disassembled and then moved via the Erie Canal on barges west to Tonawanda and then moved upstream on Ellicott Creek, but we have not yet found any reference to this bit of local history. Does anyone have some additional information or recollections from family history they can share? Contact the editor at the email address on the top of page 1 of ESX if you can assist.

SCENE ON THE LINE – continued



Note the additional tracks entering to the left (or east side) of the realigned New York Central's Niagara branch in the City of Tonawanda. These tracks are the Erie's own Suspension Bridge & Niagara Falls branch (which was freight only by 1920) and the International Railway's electrified interurban trolley line (which utilized a track leased from the Erie at that point in time.) The International also had its own High Speed Line just out of view on this map less than a quarter mile upstream on Ellicott Creek. That route between Buffalo & Niagara Falls had opened just a few years before work was underway on the Tonawanda cutoff. Those were indeed busy days for rail service in the Twin Cities of Tonawanda and North Tonawanda.

Today the former Erie right-of-way is a biking / hiking trail. The Erie crossed Ellicott Creek on a plate deck steel bridge and that is in use today as a part of the walkway. Incidentally that spot makes for a nice train watching location for the parallel former New York Central, now a part of rail giant CSX. The International Railway line was decommissioned by the mid 1920's and the High Speed line service ended in the middle 1930s, a victim of the Great Depression.



Grass structures of the Salary

The Railroad Enthusiast – July-August 1941

At the regular meeting of March 7 [1941] in the Lehigh Valley Terminal, Mr. Laurence Burke, a member, showed motion pictures of railroad ferry boats at New York. Pictures of the Milwaukee Road's Olympian were also shown.

The meeting of April 4, held in the Lehigh Valley Terminal consisted of informal discussion and exhibition of rail-fans' collections. Various members brought their railroad scrapbooks and pictures, and an interesting evening was spent looking at this material.

At the meeting of May 2 in the Lehigh Valley Terminal the program included a motion picture entitled "Cordwood Limited" showing many excellent scenes of the Live Oak, Perry & Gulf RR, that famous woodburning road in Florida.

On Sunday, May 18, a group of 74 fans enjoyed a trip over the London & Port Stanley Railway, an electric interurban line in Canada. The group left Buffalo at 7:55 am on Michigan Central train 35 and after having dinner in St. Thomas, boarded a two-car special train on the L & PS. The special then proceeded to London where a stop was made at the shops and car house. Here various cars and locomotives were brought out and spotted for photographs. Later, at the station, the fans were greeted by the President of the L & PS, who is also the Mayor of London.

On the run to Port Stanley, stops were made at various points of interest such as at trestles and bridges to let off camera fans. Then the special would back up about a quarter of a mile and make a speedy run past the photographers, thereby providing real action shots. After a short layover at Port Stanley, the return to St. Thomas was made in time to meet M.C. train 44 early in the evening for the trip back to Buffalo.
